1. Recognize when to seek professional assistance.

With the abundance of online knowledge, including how-to articles and videos, even undertakings like roofing repairs may be doable by the average homeowner. However, be cautious while attempting to DIY every roof problem.

Some jobs should be left to professionals, and you should be aware of your limitations. If any of the following scenarios sound familiar, contact a professional roofer:

- Your roof has an extremely steep slope.
- Your roof comprises tiles, stone, or other breakable materials that can split when stepped on.
- If you are concerned about accessing your roof or performing repairs.
- If you're unsure about the repairs and are afraid to try them yourself.
- If there is extensive damage, severe leaking, regular leaking, or leaks that are difficult to locate.

2. Understand when it is appropriate to fix and when to replace it.

Small areas of damage, such as a few loose shingles or minor leaks, are frequently managed by homeowners. However, all roofs must be replaced at some point. A professional roof inspection is the best approach to determine whether your roof needs to be replaced or repaired to survive longer.

3. Roof leaks are all serious business.

Even minor roof leaks can cause havoc. Roof leaks and dripping water can create apparent damage, such as dark patches on ceilings and drywall damage, but they can also cause invisible harm.

Water can seep through attic joists, supports, walls, electrical systems, and foundations. Rotting wood, dry rot, mold and mildew issues, electrical fires, and even foundation failure can result from this. Act immediately if you notice or hear evidence of a roof leak. Stop the flow of water, find the leak, and seal it. Then, fix any potential water damage and other issues caused by the leaks.

4. Put on an appropriate outfit.

A roof is a dangerous location, and you'll need to be dressed appropriately to reach the ceiling and conduct any necessary repairs. First and foremost, never attempt to climb onto your roof if you feel secure doing so.

Never walk on a roof that has significant damage and is in danger of collapsing, is composed of tiles or another material that will split under a person's weight, or is damp or slippery. Hiring a professional is advisable if you need a ladder or the proper safety equipment. Wear long, heavy-fabric pants, such as jeans or work pants, if you can access your roof. Wearing a long-sleeved shirt will also protect your arms. It is critical to wear traction-enhancing rubber-soled shoes. Shoes slick or not designed for grip can lead you to slip and fall, resulting in serious injury or even death.

5. Use the appropriate shingles for the job.

Even minor repairs necessitate matching shingles. One, two, or ten misaligned shingles from the ground can make your home an eyesore. When replacing shingles, you must match the color, brand, and specific product of your existing shingles.

That can be difficult since shingles fade and age over time, making even precise matches look odd. It can also be difficult to find older shingles; even if you can, many roofing supply businesses only sell them in bundles of 10 square feet.

Experts advocate saving extra shingles when installing a new roof; your roofing contractor should be prepared to leave any extras with you. It would help if you also did everything possible to salvage outdated shingles. If some fall off in windstorms or become loose with age, gather them and try to reattach them if they are not harmed. By keeping shingles from the original installation, you can keep the look of your actual roof.

6. The majority of leaks are caused by flashing and vents.

Flashing is the metal strips that go around windows, vents, and chimneys to prevent leaks; nevertheless, flashing and other leak guards, such as rubber seals, can crack or detach from surfaces with time.

Water may leak into those locations as a result of this. Flashing is explicitly installed in leak-prone spots, where a dormer wall meets the roof or a chimney or vent penetrates the roof surface. As a result, when flashing or vent caulking begins to leak, it can cause significant damage. Inspect flashing and spots where the roof is breached by vents or other features regularly.

7. Exposed nail heads are hazardous.

Aluminum or galvanized steel roof nails are commonly used to secure shingles, flashing, and other objects. They're designed to prevent rust and damage, although they occasionally break loose or fall out.

Exposed nail heads should be hammered back into place and coated with caulk or tar-based roof sealant. To avoid leaks, deal with exposed nails as soon as possible or hire a professional.

8. Learn how to detect and repair minor leaks.

It would help if you understood that even minor roof leaks could cause severe difficulties. Learning to detect and repair tiny leaks may save you a lot of money and is one of the most effective ways to protect your house.

Remember that the source of a leak isn't usually just above where water is leaking or collecting. You may need to trace the water back to its source. Before repairing, cover the access point outside and

wait until the rain stops and the roof has dried. Then, keep an eye on the leaking location to ensure the repair holds.

9. Flatten curling shingles and replace missing ones to protect your roof.

Individual shingles on an aging roof may curl up or shed, indicating degradation. Even if your roof is relatively new, severe rains, high winds, and storms can loosen or remove shingles.

If you observe shingles curling, stop the process by tacking them down with a dab of roofing cement or tar. Purchase it at any home improvement store, climb onto your roof (if possible), apply a dab of roofing cement or tar, and press down shingles until they adhere and stay flat.

A heat gun can warm up the shingles and make them malleable enough to perform the repair if they are cold or brittle. If shingles have come off, try to rescue them (or buy exactly matching shingles) and replace them in the area where they are missing.

This can keep a roof in good condition for months or even years, sparing you at the cost of a premature replacement.

10. Fill up minor gaps and cracks.

If you've ever removed a satellite dish or receiver, you'll notice that the small holes remain after the equipment has been removed. Filling those holes with caulk or roofing tar is critical, as even small holes might allow water to permeate the roof's surface. Water can also enter through cracks in shingles or tiles. Regardless of how little the hole or crack is or how it got there, it should be repaired as soon as you see it. If the fractures or holes are extensive, you may need to consult an expert.

11. Brick chimneys might be a significant issue.

Brick chimneys are iconic and can be beautiful, but they age and cause roof leaks. It's critical to inspect and fix any damage in and around chimneys, whether it's cracked mortar, missing bricks, or old flashing around the chimney base.

12. Selecting the appropriate roofer is critical.
