- Most of the jobs in this field are offered by the public sector. There is no downtime or holiday in crime so, the employability rate is not volatile and ups and downs are not observed in the professional field due to the tough job market or fluctuating economy. The private sector may face some ups and downs but the public sector is independent of these fluctuations. Public sector professionals in criminal justice get health insurance, training, life insurance, paid holidays, tuition assistance, sick leave, and generous retirement packages.

Some people feel the excitement of doing challenging tasks. A degree in criminal justice allows
you to accept various challenges that require special skills. You will be trained in your degree
program and professional field to think smart and learn the skill for problem-solving. This is not a
simple 9-5 job where you only work for the sake of earning. This field will never let you bore and
stale. You can get chances to meet high-profile people including governors. So, if you are looking
for an exciting and challenging career, go for criminal justice.

3. Majors in criminal justice

You can choose a different major in criminal justice according to your preferences, interests, and passions. Following are the majors offered in criminal justice degree.

Criminology is a fast-growing and fascinating major in criminal justice. People who think critically attract toward criminology. Criminology helps people to understand the minds of criminals. Detective reasoning is being taught in this major to discover patterns of committing crimes. Students who choose criminology as their major can work as detectives, criminal psychologists, forensic investigations, and as a member of crime investigation teams. The average salary of a detective is \$86k and the career growth rate is 14%.

Psychology is a major in the criminal justice field that helps you to understand the behavior of people and the reasons behind their actions. Psychology allows students to predict the future behavioral patterns of victims and culprits. You can become a member of criminal investigation teams, psychiatrists, or psychologists after earning their degree in this major. The average salary of a psychologist is \$80k per year and the career growth rate is 14%.

Information Security is also a fast-growing major in criminal justice because most of the companies are taking their operations online. You learn to handle security breaches and prevent breaches before they occur. If you are interested in Information Technology (IT) and computer sciences, this major is a good option for you. You can become a cybersecurity officer or IT officer by choosing this major. The expected career growth in information security is 32% and the average salary per year is \$100k.

Sociology can be selected as a major in criminal justice. Social workers provide rehabilitation services and human services by helping the victims to get them out of their trauma. A social worker can also provide services in public relations. Many government and private agencies provide jobs for this major. You can also start your social agency. This field has a career growth rate o 11% and an average salary of a social worker is \$50k per year.

Rehabilitation is a major in criminal justice that allows you to get the victims back on their feet after their hard times. You will study addiction forms, how the recovery of patients will start and how can you help them in their rehabilitation. The expected growth rate of this career field is 10% in the next decade and rehabilitation counselors made \$35k annually.

By majoring in **Pre-Law**, you can work as a lawyer in the field of criminal justice. You can be a criminal lawyer, public defender, or victim advocate by studying pr-law. The average career growth is 6% and the average salary is \$123k per year.

Many other majors are designed to become judge, private detective, criminal defense attorney, forensic scientist, paralegal, and intelligence analyst.

4. Degree programs in criminal justice

Criminal justice has a broad range of applications in various fields. All levels of education offer degrees for careers in criminal justice. Following are degree programs in criminal justice.

Associate degree in criminal justice

Associate degrees in criminal justice help students to train for entry-level jobs in law enforcement, security, and corrections. An associate degree is a two years degree program that includes introductory courses in criminal law, the American justice system, and social sciences. Jobs in law enforcement agencies also require training in addition to an associate degree. If you have field experience, you are extra qualified for detective and police jobs. Security guards and court clerks also hold associate degrees in criminal justice.

Bachelor's degree in criminal justice

Bachelor's degree expands the foundation skills learned in the associate program and helps in building career prospects. Criminal justice specialization is selected for a bachelor's degree. Criminology, corrections, and homeland security are common specializations. You can study Bachelor of Science (BS) or Bachelor of Arts (BA) in criminal justice that spans four years. After graduation, you can join as a victim advocate, corrections officer, and parole officer.

Master's degree in criminal justice

A Master's degree in criminal justice can enhance the career opportunities of homeland security professionals, criminal justice, and law enforcement. If you want to practice law or become a professor in this field, you can earn criminal justice degree to increase the credentials. It takes two years to complete a master's degree. You can study criminal justice administration, criminology, research methods, behavior analysis, cybercrime investigation, crime analysis, and ethics in a master's degree in criminal justice.

Doctoral degree in criminal justice

Doctoral scholars can pursue research with specialization in any major of criminal justice. Students do research and achieve teaching positions. Course work consists of management and improvement of criminal justice practices and crisis management. Ph.D. can be completed in 4 years. Scholars can pursue their careers as public policy consultants or professors of criminal justice.

5. Careers in criminal justice

Following are the career options for the graduates of criminal justice.

Information security officer works to protect cybersecurity procedures of an organization. They handle security breaches and manage software applications in the system of the organization. Bachelor's in cybersecurity or information security is needed for this job. The average income of an

information security officer is \$100k annually.

Prison wardens perform supervisory duties and administrative affairs as senior correctional officers. Many years of professional experience and a graduate degree in criminal justice are needed for this job. They earn an average of \$88k per year.

Homicide detectives investigate murder cases. They identify the potential suspect based on analysis of evidence from the crime scene. They produce written reports to support their investigations. Their average income is \$74k per year.

Forensic psychologists evaluate criminals and understand crimes by using psychology. They generate criminal profiles and judge the suspect's competency. A Ph.D. degree and a license issued by the state are required for this job. Their average salary is \$70k.

FBI agents require bachelor's degrees and job training in criminal justice or related field. Federal Bureau of Investigations hires FBI agents for investigations. They can earn an average of \$65k.

Computer forensic specialists retrieve data from digital devices including smartphones and computers. They use various software and cybersecurity techniques to retrieve deleted and corrupted data. Bachelor's degree in criminal justice or computer science is required for this job. Their average salary per year is \$62k.

Border patrol agents restrict illegal immigrations and half contraband items at the country's border. Bachelor's degree is required for this job. Their average salary is \$59k per year.

Forensic scientists analyze biological materials collected from the crime scene to solve cases. The minimum requirement for this job is a bachelor's degree for this job. Some organizations demand at least a master's degree. Their average salary is \$56k per year.

State troopers perform duties like police officers. They are state-level law enforcement officers. Troopers arrest and investigate criminals, secure crime scenes, and provide services in natural disasters. They earn an average of \$54k annually.

Police officers enforce local laws and ensure public safety and security by patrolling. They also respond to emergency calls and complaints by the public. Troops arrest and ask questions to the criminals to solve criminal cases. Bachelor's degree in criminal justice is required for this job. Police officers earn a mean \$52k annually.

You can also join as a court reporter, paralegal, crime analyst, crime scene investigator, deputy sheriff, parole officer, probation officer, correctional officer, security officer, and victim officer.
