- Before installing gutter guards, clean out the gutters.
- Select the appropriate gutter guards for your home.
- Either install the guards yourself or pay a professional to do it.

Safety Considerations

- Hang a bucket from an S-hook on the ladder for easy access to tools and supplies.
- Use a stand-alone ladder rather than one that rests directly on the gutters.
- Enlist the assistance of a friend or family member or stand near the ladder's base to help prevent dangerous falls.

STEP 1: Determine whether you have the essential tools and abilities to finish the task.

DIY gutter guards are a great way to save money, but only if the homeowner has the necessary materials and skills to get the project done the first time correctly. They'll need a ladder, tape measure, hammer, and screwdriver to get started.

If a homeowner does not already own a saw, they will need to rent or acquire a circular saw to cut sections of gutter guard to match the home's façade. However, tools and materials are only part of the formula for gutter guard installation success.

A homeowner should also have some expertise or DIY abilities, as well as decent balance, because this project requires significant time on a ladder. If a homeowner is unsure of their skills or is afraid of heights, it may be time to abandon the concept of DIY gutter guards and hire a professional instead.

STEP 2: Select the best gutter guard for your home.

The greatest gutter guards for a property will be determined by various factors, including the material's durability and the homeowner's budget. Gutter guards can cost anywhere from \$591 to \$2,197, with the average being \$1,347.

If a homeowner prefers to do it themselves, brush or foam gutter guards provide the most straightforward installation and the lowest cost (though they are known to be less durable). Micro-mesh and surface tension gutter guards are the most durable but require professional installation.

To choose the right style of gutter guards, homeowners should analyze the sorts of debris that accumulate in their gutters. For example, if a homeowner lives in an area highly forested with pine trees, they may want to consider one of the best gutter guards for pine needles. Gutters are commonly measured in linear feet. To decide how many gutters guards to purchase, homeowners should use a tape measure.

STEP 3: Clear the gutters of any leaves and debris.

Before installing gutter guards or having them professionally installed, a homeowner should clear up the gutters to ensure that no leaves, debris, or water become caught once the guards are in place.

If homeowners lack the time or tools to clean their gutters, they can use one of the best gutter cleaning services. Gutter cleaning rates range from \$118 to \$224, based on the number of linear feet of gutters and the height of the home. Travel time and any future repairs may also be considered.

STEP 4: Check the gutters to ensure they are in good working order.

It's a good idea to test the gutters with water and a hose to make sure they're clean and ready for guard installation. A homeowner can perform this step by turning on the water and inserting a hose into the gutters to examine how freely water flows through them. Leaves or debris may still be in the gutters if the water is slow to depart the downspout. If water flows easily and out of the downspout, it's time to install gutter guards.

STEP 5: Gather your tools and follow the manufacturer's directions to install the gutter guards.

The more carefully a homeowner follows the manufacturer's instructions, the easier installation should be. It's a good idea to acquire all of the necessary supplies and tools beforehand.

For quick access, homeowners can place their screwdriver and hammer in a bucket and hang it on an S-hook on the ladder. To cut and install gutter guards, homeowners should follow the manufacturer's instructions. A circular saw or handsaw will be needed to cut the guards. Each protective piece must be securely fastened during installation. If there is a storm and the gutter guard is not secure, it will not accomplish its duty. This could cause water damage.

STEP 6: Hire an expert to install gutter guards.

Installing gutter guards may appear to be a simple task, but it may be unexpectedly difficult if a

homeowner lacks the necessary DIY skills. Homeowners who are intimidated by gutter guard installation instructions or are doubtful of their abilities to work on a ladder may prefer to have the gutter guards installed by a professional.

Yes. Cleaning your gutters at least twice a year is recommended since they can still gather dirt and

debris. If you do not wipe them out, a backup of rainwater may occur, resulting in floods, home damage, or mosquito outbreaks.

Q. Is it necessary to put gutter guards beneath shingles?

It is usually preferable to place gutter guards on top of shingles. Installing them beneath shingles can jeopardize the roof's protection and cause water damage to the roof's structure.
